








Animals Admitted: 2005-2010

Targeted Spays & Neuters




*The majority of the no-pay surgeries are done in partnership with AnimalKind, and the rest are due to special events. In this period, special events made up 18 surgeries in 2008, 23 in 2009, and 52 in 2010.

Animal Litter Intakes 2007-2010

	2010	2009	2008	2007	Average (2007 - 2009)
Total litters	316	372	449	351	391
Total animals in litters	1137	1334	1749	1201	1428
Total intakes	3616	4036	4474	4304	4271
Litter animals as a percentage of intake	31%	33%	39%	28%	33%

Other Observations

- Non-Spay/Neuter
 - Out of County surrender fee
 - Field service fees for surrenders
 - Changes in cat trapping program
- Spay/Neuter
 - Multiple initiatives in Triangle
 - Fixed clinics (including HQ HV LC clinics)
 - Mobile clinics (POP-NC, etc.)
- It's a community effort!
- Even clearer picture going forward
