

<p>Orange County Schools Board of Education</p>	<p>Obesity, Access</p>	<p>At the August 25, 2014 meeting, the Board voted on the Smart Snacks Nutrition Standards for Orange County Schools and approved Option 1. Option 1 provides that schools are prohibited from selling foods and beverages to students in competition with the school nutrition program until 30 minutes after the dismissal bell rings. This includes vending machines, school stores, fundraisers, and other venues on the school campus during the instructional day.</p> <p>This change was a result of federal changes from the Healthy-Hunger-Free Kids Act of 2010.</p> <hr/> <p>At the September 22, 2014 meeting, the Board received the Student Achievement Data report. The report shows data that highlights the achievements, strengths, and weaknesses of students and schools in the district.</p> <p>It is included here due to the connection with the Family Success Alliance’s focus on child well-being and academic outcomes.</p>
<p>Chapel Hill/Carrboro City Schools Board of Education</p>	<p>Access</p>	<p>At the September 18, 2014 meeting, the 2014 Accountability Report was presented by Dr. Diane Villwock. This annual report details the district’s academic progress and student outcomes. It is included here due to the connection with the Family Success Alliance’s focus on child well-being and academic outcomes.</p> <p>Some highlights identified by the district include:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Highest ever African American student graduation rate, 89.7 percent, up from 81.2 in 2012-13.

		<ul style="list-style-type: none"> • Overall growth on 4th - 8th grade End-of-Grade Tests in Math and Reading and all • End-of-Course Tests were in the Exceeded Expected Growth Range. • Seventy one (71) percent of students scored at or above the path to become CollegeReady by graduation; • 77 percent were proficient, ie: ready for the next grade level. • The group with the fewest met goals continues to be Economically Disadvantaged (93 of 117 or 79.4 percent).
<p>Board of County Commissioners</p>	<p>Obesity, SAMH</p>	<p>At their September 9, 2014 meeting, the BOCC passed a resolution in support of the Community Use of School Facilities for Recreation. The Health Department presented a letter of support from the Health Director in support of this item.</p> <p>Commissioner Dorosin also commented at this meeting that the Alcohol Beverage Control Board expects to see high sales profits this year. Above a state-defined limit, the money must be returned to the county. Commissioner Dorosin asked the Chair/Vice Chair to approach the ABC Board about excess profits being used in the county. This information was relayed to Dr. Bridger, who is a member of the Town/Gown Collaborative to reduce the negative impacts of high risk drinking, for action.</p> <p>Note: This collaborative will be presenting its final report to the Mayor of Chapel Hill and Chancellor of UNC in October and releasing the final report to the public and addressing the ABC Board in November.</p> <hr/> <p>At their joint meeting with the BOCC, the DSS Board discussed the issue of poverty in Orange County. DSS recommended that a priority be to: "Provide child care for all target groups and reduce wait time for child care to less than six months"</p>
<p>Chapel Hill Town Council</p>	<p>Obesity, Access</p>	<p>At their June 9, 2014 meeting, the Chapel Hill Town Council adopted the Chapel Hill Bike Plan as part of the town's 2020 plan.</p>

<p>Hillsborough Board of Commissioners</p>	<p>Obesity, Access</p>	<p>At their August 18, 2014 meeting, the Board received a report from Triangle Transit regarding the siting for a new park-and-ride for the planned Mebane to Durham route. No decision was made – TTA is still looking for a site.</p> <p><i>Presentation available on request from Meredith.</i></p>
<p>Orange Unified Transportation Board (OUTBoard)</p>	<p>Obesity, Access</p>	<p>At their August 20, 2014 meeting, the OUTBoard discussed the ongoing issue of bicycling safety, particularly in rural Orange County. There was a controversial and publicized case this summer of a cyclist being harassed and run off the road that prompted the discussion. No action steps were taken.</p>

<p>Family Success Alliance</p>	<p>Access</p>	<p>The Family Success Alliance Council has now met twice. It has officially named the work the Family Success Alliance and approved the Request for Proposal process for zone applications.</p>
