Overview of Existing and Previous Plans

The following is a brief summary of plans and reports completed during the past 20 years that support the parks and recreation programs in Orange County. Most plans included an assessment of existing facilities, an identification of park and facilities' needs, and a recommended strategy for funding projects, acquiring land, and working collaboratively with other jurisdictions, sometimes including the school districts, to serve the public needs.

New Hope Corridor Open Space Master Plan (1991)

Coulter Associates and the New Hope Creek Corridor Advisory Committee prepared this plan commissioned by Orange County, the City of Durham, Durham County, and the Town of Chapel Hill. The intention was to create a plan for linking Eno River State Park, New Hope Creek, Corps of Engineers land, and Durham and Chapel Hill open space for recreational as well as environmental, educational, and aesthetic purposes. Orange County adopted this plan in 1992 as an amendment to the County's comprehensive plan. The plan identified critical areas to be protected through purchase, donation, or acquisition of development rights, including the stream course, floodplains, steep slopes, large tracts with historic, recreational, or educational value. The plan also called for creating a permanent advisory committee to help carry out the plan.

The New Hope Corridor Open Space Master Plan identified 1,100 acres of floodplain, 45 acres of steep slopes, and 554 acres of uplands for purchase and protection. Additionally, the plan recommended acquisition of development rights for 103 acres and 20 miles of trails development. Total project cost estimates ranged between \$14.3 million and \$25.3 million.

New Hope Corridor Master Plan Proposal Linking Duke Forest and Eno River State Park (1993)

A study by the UNC Department of City and Regional Planning that identified potential corridors in east-central Orange County that would create links to Duke Forest for wildlife and recreation uses. The plan employed biophysical attributes such as land cover and terrain to help identify possible corridors. The study recommended creating a recreation trail loop connecting Duke Forest to Eno River State Park along a Duke Energy easement and parallel to I-85. A separate 200-foot-wide wildlife corridor would run from Eno River State Park, along Rhodes Creek, and parallel to the Southern Railway. Implementation strategies included purchasing recreation easements and corridors; siting trails in transportation setbacks, street right-of-ways, and the Duke Power easement; creating a pedestrian bridge across I-85 and a wildlife underpass at the I-85-US 70 interchange; and encouraging the clustering of development.

Report of Orange County's Recreation and Parks Work Group (1996)

Orange County's Recreation and Parks Work Group developed recommendations to establish principles for coordinated county-wide recreation and park facility planning. The intent was to foster greater cooperation in use of existing facilities as well as to encourage private recreation providers and public/private partnerships. The work group developed recommendations that were presented to the Assembly of Governments, including setting park standards, an inventory of park and recreational facilities, and the inclusion of park facilities in new school sites.

Payment in Lieu/Dedication Legislation and Report (1996)

The Orange County Board of County Commissioners directed staff in 1995-96 to review the dedication/payments-in-lieu provisions of Orange County's subdivision regulations. It discussed the statutory basis and methods for the County to require developers of subdivisions to help pay for parks and recreation land acquisition that serves subdivision residents. The report included payment-in-lieu

formulas and recommended a park impact fee for subdivision development, which would allow the County to apply revenues to open spaces and greenways in addition to conventional parks and recreation facilities.

Report on Coordination of Recreation and Parks Services (1997)

This report described different options for the improvement of community services through intergovernmental coordination of parks and recreation functions, including:

- A county-wide long range plan for parks and recreation
- Acquisition and protection of good park sites
- A lead role for Orange County in funding, acquisition, development, ownership, and maintenance of new facilities
- Coordination and work toward partial consolidation of selected functions; and
- A county-wide bond proposal, which led to the 1997 County-wide Parks Bond

Joint Master Recreation and Parks Work Group Report (1999)

In response to the 1996 and 1997 reports, Orange County's Recreation and Parks Work Group was asked to "update and modify the Master Recreation and Parks Plan to be a joint long-range capital facilities plan for Orange County, Carrboro, and Chapel Hill." They did the following:

- Created a template for tracking existing and future recreational facilities
- Summarized the primary needs for each jurisdiction
- Set goals and criteria for future land acquisition and facility siting, emphasizing joint management of school and park sites
- Identified the need to preserve green corridors, and identified strategic corridors that could be used to link greenway networks to parks and open space
- Identified issues with existing town payment-in-lieu of dedication programs

The report provided an inventory of facilities and community parks needs for each jurisdiction, as well as recommendations on a variety of issues, including:

- Formation of an Intergovernmental Parks Work Group to share information and explore collaboration opportunities;
- Possible funding mechanisms;
- Use of the County's Lands Legacy program as a vehicle for coordinated parkland acquisition; and
- The need for a bond referendum to address parkland deficits.

A Lands Legacy Program for Orange County (2000)

This report was prepared by the former Environment and Resource Conservation Department (ERCD). It suggested ways to establish a new program for the identification and protection of critical natural and cultural resources. The report evaluated different approaches to land acquisition, land management and stewardship, and funding. The report recommended identifying priority lands using a comprehensive resource database and detailed site criteria for evaluating potential land acquisitions. Goals and objectives for parkland acquisition were included from the Joint Master Recreation and Parks Work Group Report.

The report recommended formulating an annual action plan, using outreach to the public and collaborating with potential conservation partners. Initial priority was recommended for acquiring

parkland, including parkland adjacent to schools, preserving natural areas, and prime farmland. An inventory of lands in Orange County showed that only 0.24% of land was County-owned; mostly small, scattered parcels, none of which was used for recreation, although the County's newly-opened Efland-Cheeks Park was on land owned by Orange County Schools.

Joint Capital Funding for Parks Report (2000)

This report was presented to the Assembly of Governments in 2000. It explored the possibilities for joint parks, and suggested a mechanism for County and town roles for future joint parks. The report recommended the County take a lead on capital funding and land acquisition and the towns take the lead for operation and maintenance of joint facilities. This report was a precursor to the 2001 Parks, Recreation and Open Space Bond.

The report identified the following key objectives:

- Ongoing work of the Inter-Governmental Parks Working Group
- Development of Inter-jurisdictional standards
- Joint Siting, Design and Management of School Parks and Sites
- Public / Private Partnerships
- Joint Capital Facilities Planning / Coordinated Land Acquisition
- Open Facilities Policy
- Payment-in-Lieu Changes
- Address Existing Needs

A New Era for Parks (2001)

This report explored the relationship between Orange County's Environment and Resource Conservation Department (ERCD) and the Recreation and Parks Department. It also covered roles of each department in the creation and operation of parks. The report recommended hiring an Open Space Design Specialist to save on consulting fees, and explored different options for the stewardship and maintenance of the County's parks and open space. Finally, the report found that much of the park programming was provided by independent athletic associations in cooperation with Recreation and Parks, and this was expected to continue.

Recreation and Parks Strategic Operations Plan (2005)

The Board of County Commissioners requested a document detailing expected growth in the Recreation and Parks Department's responsibilities and expectations. Findings indicated that parks would require more resources for staffing, operations, and capital outlay due to planned expansion of park facilities to meeting the demands of a growing population.

Composite Countywide Plan for Parks and Trails (2006)

This plan summarized parks and recreation plans of Orange County and the four municipal jurisdictions (Chapel Hill, Carrboro, Hillsborough, Mebane) by listing, describing, and mapping planned and existing facilities. The report recommended updates every two years.




Census 2010 Total Population

Total Population Census Block Group





Census 2010 Total Population Under 5 Years Old





Census 2010 Total Population 65 and Older











BACKGROUND

Orange County Department of Environment, Agriculture, Parks and Recreation will be updating its Comprehensive Parks and Recreation Master Plan this year. In an effort to get more representative citizen input our department sought feedback from youth in county-funded summer programs to assess their interest in Orange County Parks and Recreation programs.

METHODS

Youth from ages 7-16 were given brief surveys with questions related to both parks and recreation programming. The participants were asked to complete the surveys onsite towards the end of their summer camp program. Participants were surveyed at the close of their programming to enable them to more accurately and more conclusively reflect on their entire week at the camp. Youth from ages 14-16 were given a slightly longer survey that asked for more detailed responses than youth between the ages of 7-13.

The participants were from the Central Recreation Center's Pre-teen Adventure Camp, Basketball Camp, Creative Arts Camp, and the Teen Adventure Camps. Youth from Cooperative Extension's 4-H program Summer Sizzle were also surveyed at their camp site. The Summer Sizzle participants were included in this study because the program receives partial funding from the county. There were 97 surveys completed and analyzed. Of the 97 surveys completed nine were completed by the Teen Adventure Camp group.

MAJOR TRENDS SUMMARY

Youth ages 7-12

Favorite Park Trends

Of all of the parks in the county Gold Park was the park mentioned the most by respondents. This trend could be due to the close proximity Gold Park has to the Central Recreation Center. Respondents could have listed this park merely because it was the one they remembered passing throughout the week prior to completing the survey. Fairview Park was the second park mentioned frequently.

Respondents who listed Gold Park as their favorite park justified their choice by noting the park's equipment. For example, a respondent from the Pre-Teen Adventure Camp commented, "Gold Park, [is my favorite] because it has tons of bike trails; I love biking." A respondent from the Creative Arts morning group commented, "Gold Park, [is my favorite] because they have geocoaches and dog parks."

A respondent from the Summer Sizzle group commented, "Fairview Park, [is my favorite] because I like the equipment they have." A couple of respondents from the basketball camp group also noted Fairview Park's diversity of equipment and items to play on. They stated, "Fairview Park, [is my favorite] because it has lots of games to play."

Non-park users mostly attributed their lack of park participation to the fact that they were "visiting their other parent for the summer" (respondent from the Summer Sizzle group).

Favorite Activity Trends

The top activity across all the groups is basketball. As expected, the Basketball Camp group tended to select basketball as their favorite activity more consistently than the other surveyed groups. Respondents in the Summer Sizzle group also selected basketball more consistently as their favorite activity. The Basketball Camp group had the highest total of survey respondents overall which most likely attributes to their tendency to outnumber the responses of the other groups.

Biking was the second activity selected as a favorite by the other surveyed groups, followed by playing on the monkey bars. Biking and playing on the monkey bars tended to be mentioned more by the Creative Arts groups. This tendency may be attributed to the fact that this respondent group tended to be younger than the Basketball and Summer Sizzle Camp members. The Pre-Teen Adventure Camp group also tended to select biking as their favorite sport to participate in at the park.

Suggested Park Improvements

Newer volleyball nets and more basketball goals and courts were among the top suggested park improvements for Fairview Park. Also, making more trails (biking, hiking, and walking) for Efland Cheeks Park, Gold Park, Eno River Park, and Community Park were suggested by survey respondents.

Best Activity in Recreation Program this summer

The best activity chosen by the Basketball Camp group was having basketball scrimmages and playing other group games like Knockout.

The best activity chosen by the Creative Arts Camp groups was making the "ugly dolls." Both the morning and afternoon groups tended to select this activity as their favorite.


The Summer Sizzle group overall selected going bowling and roller skating as their favorite camp activities.


The Pre-Teen Adventure group overall selected going to Adventure Landing was their favorite summer camp activity.


Other Camps

Because both Central Recreation Center and Summer Sizzle programs typically are one week some program participants are also enrolled in other programs. The largest trend is that participants in the Summer Sizzle group tend to be only enrolled in this summer camp, whereas participants in the Central Recreation Center Camps tend to be enrolled in multiple camps. The top “non-county affiliated” camps mentioned were Duke Basketball Camp, Duke Soccer Camp, Orange High School’s basketball camp, Centri Kid Camp, and British Soccer Camp (see APPENDIX for other camps mentioned).

Parks Visit Trends with Age Group

All Teen Adventure Camp respondents stated that they do not go to the park much. This trend may be attributed to the fact that some respondents may have less leisure time because of heavy college preparatory course loads.

Closest Park Trend

The closest parks mentioned were Efland Cheeks Park, Anderson Park, and Chapel Hill Community Center.

Average Time to Park Location

Most respondents stated that the nearest park was within 5 minutes to their home.

Park cleanliness

Most respondents reported that they always find the park nearest to their home clean.

Park safety

Most respondents reported that they sometimes do not feel safe when they visit the park.

Favorite park activity

Swimming, playing basketball, playing volleyball, playing ping pong, and having picnics were listed as favorite park activities among this group.

Most Used Park Item Trend

Bike trails, athletic fields, sand volleyball courts, and the swimming pool were listed as the most used park items.

Equipment Maintenance

Most respondents reported that they usually find the condition of the equipment to be good rather than excellent or poor at the park.

Recreation Facility Improvements

When asked about the recreation facilities they would like to see improved or repaired the top responses selected were for repairs to be made to the tennis and volleyball courts, soccer fields, playgrounds, and mountain bike trails.

Participation in Central Recreation Center Programming Trend with this Age Group

Most respondents reported that they only participate in Central Recreation Center programs in the summer. Two respondents indicated that they participate in spring programs, and one respondent indicated that they participate in Central Recreation Center programs all year. As with park use, these program participation trends may also be attributed to heavy course loads during the academic school year and participation in afterschool clubs, etc.

Activity and/or Programming Wishlist for next year

Most respondents did not indicate any future activities to improve their camp experience. One respondent did however indicate that they would like Central Recreation Center to offer music classes.

Other Camps

Most respondents indicated that they did not attend other camps this summer. Those that reported attending other camps listed Sports Plex, Camp Kanata, and Camp Graham as the host sites.

Activities Done at Other Camps

The three respondents that indicated other summer camp participation reported that in other camps they:

- *“Made friendship bracelets,”*
- *“Swam and skated, and”*
- *“Played volleyball, went to the Alpine Tower, played field games, and did synchronized swimming”*

LIMITATIONS OF STUDY

This study’s findings do not reflect the opinions of all the youth in Orange County because the survey was only given to youth currently enrolled in county-sponsored summer camps at Central Recreation Center and Cooperative Extension’s 4-H Summer Sizzle program. Because the study was voluntary some program participants opted not to complete the survey.

NEXT STEP

The next step for this study is to administer the surveys in schools during the academic school year. Administering the surveys during the school will increase the pool of respondents enabling the study to have a more representative sample of youth. A more representative sample of youth opinion will allow the Department of Environment, Agriculture, Parks and Recreation (DEAPR) to make future changes to parks and programs that are desired by the youth who use and benefit from them.



INTRODUCTION

Dr. Nancy Gladwell and Dr. Erick Byrd, from The University of North Carolina Greensboro (UNCG), conducted a parks and recreation needs assessment for Orange County (NC). The needs assessment was conducted from March 17, 2012 to February 5, 2013. Park and recreation needs assessments are conducted for several reasons, including:

1. To provide county residents the opportunity to express their views regarding parks and recreation as part of community life;
2. To provide county residents the opportunity to express their views relative to satisfaction with existing park and recreations area, facilities, programs, and services;
3. To identify county residents' interest regarding the implementation of new programs and services that meet the needs of the county and respond to new trends in parks and recreation;
4. To avoid unnecessary duplication and over-provision of programs and facilities;
5. To identify county residents' interest in the development of future park and recreation areas and facilities;
6. To provide public officials with the information needed to prioritize future park and recreation area and facility development;
7. To justify capital improvements, quite often as part of a grant process;
8. To identify funding mechanisms that are acceptable for parks and recreation area and facility development; and
9. To foster ownership of park and recreation programs and facilities by county residents.

The **purpose of this study** was to conduct a needs assessment in order to determine the leisure interests and preferences of Orange County residents. The information presented in the final report relative to the interests and preferences of residents regarding recreation programs and services will be incorporated in the subsequent preparation of a comprehensive master plan for park and recreation program and facility development for Orange County. The master plan will prioritize future recreation program and facility development, estimate financial costs associated with the development of specific recreation programs and facilities, and identify potential site location(s) for facility development. The needs assessment, public hearings and focus groups conducted as part of the planning process, and master plan for parks and recreation facility development are essential components of the grant process required by the North Carolina Park and Recreation Trust Fund.

METHODS

The needs assessment research team worked closely with the Orange County Department of Environment, Agriculture, Parks, and Recreation (DEAPR) staff in the development of the needs assessment instrument. The survey was designed to elicit information regarding the following:

- Parks and Recreation Facility Usage;
- General Parks and Recreation Information;
- Recreation Activity Participation;
- Future Recreation Programs/Activities;
- Future Parks and Recreation Facilities;
- Financing Recreation and Park Facility Development; and
- Demographics.

The needs assessment instrument received final approval by Orange County Department of Environment, Agriculture, Parks and Recreation (DEAPR) on September 10, 2012. See Appendix A for a copy of the needs assessment instrument.

A cover letter, signed by Drs. Gladwell and Byrd, and the needs assessment survey were mailed to 4,200 randomly selected households in Orange County on September 29, 2012. See Appendix B for a copy of the cover letter. Survey recipients were asked to complete and return the self-addressed stamped survey to the needs assessment research team at the Department of Community and Therapeutic Recreation at UNCG.

Of the 4,200 surveys mailed, 9 surveys were returned as non-deliverable. A post card reminder was mailed on October 16, 2012 to all households included in the study sample. The cut-off date for receiving returned surveys was December 7, 2012. Data analysis and preparation of the written needs assessment final report occurred from December 3, 2012 – February 5, 2013. Of the 520 surveys returned, 17 were unusable. Thus, a total of 503 surveys were returned and analyzed for a response rate of 12.1 percent.

The needs assessment report was delivered to Orange County Department of Environment, Agriculture, Parks and Recreation on February 7, 2013.

FINDINGS

This section reports the data obtained from the needs assessment survey instrument. Descriptive statistics were utilized to analyze the data using the statistical software SPSS 19. Please note that throughout the findings section of this report, the Orange County Department of Environment, Agriculture, Parks and Recreation (DEAPR) will be referred to as Orange County Parks and Recreation. This was also done in the survey instrument to reduce confusion for the residents who completed the survey.

PART 1: PARKS AND RECREATION FACILITY USAGE

The purpose of Part 1 of the needs assessment instrument was to determine which parks and/or recreation centers the respondent or a member of the respondent’s household had used in the previous 12 months and how frequently the park and/or recreation center were used. Part 1 asked about parks and/or recreation centers owned or operated by Orange County as well as parks and/or recreation centers outside of Orange County.

The first question asked survey respondents to indicate the parks and/or recreation centers, owned or operated by Orange County, they or a member of their household had used during the previous 12 months. Five parks and/or recreation centers which were used most by respondents were Triangle Sportsplex (34.2%), Little River Regional Park and Natural Area (13.7%), River Park-Farmers Market Pavilion (13.3%), Cedar Grove Park (10.5%), and Central Recreation Center and Park (10.5%). The parks that were used least by the respondents or a member of their household were Efland-Cheeks Community Center (1.6%), Fairview Park (3.4%), Efland-Cheeks Park (3.6%), and Eurosport Soccer Center (7.6%) (see Table 1).



As a follow-up, the respondents were asked which of the above parks and/or recreation centers were used most frequently by them or a member of their household. The Triangle Sportsplex was cited by 131 respondents. The next most frequently used facilities were Little River Regional Park and Natural Area (n=34), River Park-Farmers Market Pavilion (n=25), Central Recreation Center and Park (n=24), Eurosport Soccer Center (n=23), and Cedar Grove Park (n=19). Since the respondents included several additional parks and/or recreation centers, a complete listing can be found in Appendix C.

If the survey respondents or a member of their household had traveled outside of Orange County to visit parks or use recreation facilities/centers in the previous year, they were asked to provide the name of the park or recreation facility, its location, and the type of activity they participated in at that park or recreation facility. Due the large number of responses to this question, the results can be found in Appendix D. The following are the top 10 parks or recreation facilities, outside of Orange County, that the respondents or a member of their household had used the previous year: Eno River State Park, Jordan Lake, Duke Forest/Gardens/Park, Umstead Park, Pullen Park, Burlington City Park, Hank Anderson Park, Gold Park, Lake Michael, and Homestead Aquatic Center/Park.

The respondents were then asked how often they or a member of their household traveled outside Orange County to visit parks or use other recreation facilities/centers. As seen in Figure 1, 26.4 percent of the respondents indicated they (or a member of their household) never traveled outside of Orange County to visit or use other recreation facilities/centers. For the respondents who indicated they traveled outside Orange County to visit parks or use other recreation facilities/centers, the frequency was quarterly (23.3%), annually (22.2%), monthly (15.8%), weekly (10.8%), and daily (1.5%).

PART 2: GENERAL PARKS AND RECREATION INFORMATION

The purpose of Part 2 of the needs assessment was to gather general information regarding Orange County residents' opinions on the recreation and park programs, facilities, and services offered by Orange County Parks and Recreation. Respondents were asked to circle the response that best described how they feel about each of the 15 statements included in this section. Topics included types of recreation programs, management of facilities, and the potential impacts of parks and recreation programs. Possible responses were:

1 = Strongly Agree

2 = Agree

3 = Disagree

4 = Strongly Disagree

5 = Don't Know

Two thirds of the respondents (66.6%) "strongly agreed" or "agreed" Orange County Parks and Recreation provides quality parks and recreation opportunities for its residents. Roughly half of the respondents (53.5%) "strongly agreed" or "agreed" Orange County Parks and Recreation needs to expand *active* outdoor recreation opportunities (e.g., running trails, playgrounds, ball fields, swimming pool, etc.), while 58.9 percent "strongly agreed" or "agreed" that Orange County Parks and Recreation should provide additional opportunities for *passive* outdoor recreation (e.g., walking trails, fishing, nature study, etc.).

Slightly over one third of the respondents (36.3%) "strongly agreed" or "agreed" Orange County Parks and Recreation needs to provide an indoor facility for the arts and other leisure pursuits. Also, 42.6 percent "strongly agreed" or "agreed" Orange County Parks and Recreation needs to provide an indoor athletic complex (e.g., gymnasium, fitness facility, etc.).

A total of 61.1 percent of respondents "strongly agreed" or "agreed" that Orange County Parks and Recreation facilities are safe. It should be noted that only 3.4 percent of respondents "strongly disagreed" or "disagreed" that the facilities are safe, with the remainder (35.5%) selecting "did not know." Similarly, 60.5 percent of respondents "strongly agreed" or "agreed" that Orange County Parks and Recreation facilities are well-maintained, again with a low number (3.8%) selecting "disagreed" or "strongly disagreed."

The majority (60.7%) of the respondents "strongly agreed" or "agreed" Orange County Parks and Recreation facilities are easy to get to. Slightly more than two fifths (41.1%) "strongly agreed" or "agreed" that Orange County recreation programs and events are well run/operated. It should be noted that 54.3 percent of the respondents "did not know" if the county's recreation programs and events are well run/operated.

Slightly over one fourth of the respondents (26.3%) "strongly agreed" or "agreed" Orange County parks and facilities are accessible for use by people with disabilities, however, the majority of respondents (70.7%) "did not know" if the county's parks and facilities are accessible for use by people with a disability.

Over two thirds of the respondents (68.3%) “strongly agreed” or “agreed” that Orange County Parks and Recreation should expand/provide a trail system linking various areas within the county. In regards to departmental staff, 43.1 percent of respondents said that they “strongly agreed” or “agreed” that the Orange County Parks and Recreation staff is helpful and professional, while only 3.6 percent “disagreed” or “strongly disagreed” and 53.3 percent “did not know”.

The majority of respondents (70.4%) “strongly agreed” or “agreed” that public parks and recreation programs enhance the economic health of Orange County. A solid majority of the respondents (81.1%) “strongly agreed” or “agreed” that public parks and recreation programs enhance the physical and mental well-being of Orange County residents. Lastly, 33.7 percent of respondents “strongly agreed” or “agreed” that public parks and recreation programs help to reduce crime in Orange County while only 9.5 percent “disagreed” or “strongly disagreed” and 56.8 percent “did not know”

PART 3: RECREATION ACTIVITY PARTICIPATION

Part 3 of the Orange County Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment’s purpose is to develop a better understanding of the current recreation participation of county residents. This section is comprised of eight questions including specific recreational activity participation as well as participation in recreational activities outside of Orange County.

Orange County residents were asked what athletic leagues or programs, offered by Orange County Park and Recreation, they or a member of their household had participated in within the past 12 months. Most of the respondents indicated that they did not participate (all activities were below 10.0% participation) in any of the athletic leagues or programs offered by Orange County. Of those that did participate, the top two activities were Youth Soccer with 6.2% of the respondents participating closely followed by Youth Basketball with 5.8% of respondents indicating participation (see Table 3). For a list of “other” athletic leagues or programs, offered by Orange County Park and Recreation, the respondents or a member of their household had participated in during the previous 12 month, see Appendix E.

Respondents were further asked during what season they participated in these activities (Youth Soccer and Youth Basketball). Most did not specify a season. Other activities and programs that had more than 1% of the respondents participating were Open Gym, Little River Trail Run, Volleyball, Men’s Basketball, and Adult Hockey.

Respondents were asked what Orange County Parks and Recreation instructional programs they or a member of their household had participated in over the past 12 months. Similar to the athletic leagues or programs, most of the respondents indicated that they did not participate (all listed activities were below 5.0% participation) in any of the listed instructional programs. Of the activities in which respondents participated, Zumba (3.0%) was the most popular (see Table 4). Other instructional programs that at least 1.0 percent of the respondents participated in were

Yoga (1.6%), Tai Chi (1.4%), Creative Arts (1.2%), Pilates (1.0%), and Tennis (1.0%). For a list of “other” instructional programs offered by Orange County Parks and Recreation the respondents or a member of their household had participated in during the previous 12 month, see Appendix F.

The next question asked respondents what camps, offered by Orange County Parks and Recreation, they or a member of their household had attended in the past 12 months. As with the previous questions in this section, most respondents indicated that they had not attended any of these camps in the past year. Only two camps, Basketball (1.4%) and Soccer (1.2%) had more than 1.0% of respondents in attendance (see Table 5). For a list of “other” camps offered by Orange County Park and Recreation, the respondents or a member of their household had participated in during the previous 12 month, see Appendix G.

Orange County residents were asked what Orange County Parks and Recreation special events they or a member of their household had attended in the past 12 months. Most of the respondents indicated that they did not attend (all events were below 5% respondent participation) any of the special events offered by Orange County. Of those that did participate, the Egg Hunt Celebration (3.4%) and Earth Day Fair (2.0%) were the most popular. Other events that had 1.0% or more of the respondents attending were Fishing Rodeo Halloween (1.4%), Spooktacular (1.4%), and the Holiday Party (1.0%) (see Table 6). For a list of “other” special events offered by Orange County Parks and Recreation the respondents or a member of their household had participated in during the previous 12 months see Appendix H.



If the survey respondents or a member of their household had traveled outside of Orange County to participate in a recreation program in the previous year, they were asked to provide the name of the park or recreation facility, its location, and the type of activity they participated in at that park or recreation facility. The activity most frequently listed was hiking (n=10). The most common locations were Durham (n=20) and Chapel Hill (n=13). The most common facilities used were Eno River State Park (n=5) and YMCA-Chapel Hill (n=5). For a full list of responses, please see the comments in Appendix I.

Residents of Orange County were asked how frequently they or a member of their household had traveled outside of the county to participate in recreation programs. Most (66.8%) of respondents indicated that they had never participated in recreational programs or activities outside of the county. For the respondents who indicated they traveled outside Orange County to participate in recreation programs, the frequency was annually (13.7%), quarterly (6.6%), monthly (6.4%), weekly (5.5%), and daily (0.9%). See Figure 2.

Respondents were asked if they had tried and been unable to participate in an Orange County recreation program. If so, they were asked to identify the reason(s) they were unable to participate. As can be seen in Table 8, the top reasons indicated were the program in which they wanted to participate was at an inconvenient time/day (12.9%); it was too far to travel (7.4%); the program was not offered for the age group needed (6.6%); and the program was full (4.2%).. For a list of “other” reasons respondents or a member of their household were unable to participate in Orange County Parks and Recreation programs, see Appendix J.

PART 4: FUTURE RECREATION PROGRAMS/ACTIVITIES


The purpose of Part 4 of the needs assessment was to gauge the respondents' interest in future recreation *programs and activities* offered by Orange County. This section contained two questions. The first provided a list from which respondents were asked to check the top five programs and/or activities they would like to see offered by Orange County over the next ten years. The second asked whether or not they thought Orange County needed additional recreation programs. A comment section to add additional programs that were not listed was also included.

The top five recreation programs the respondents would like to see offered or expanded were walking (22.1%), hiking (21.9%), biking (16.3%), yoga (15.5%), and gardening (14.7%).

Four other recreation programs that at least 10.0 percent of respondents would like to see offered or expanded over the next ten years were swimming (13.3%), dog obedience class (10.3%), kayaking (10.3%), and tennis (10.1%). See Table 9 for a complete listing of programs.

When asked if Orange County needed additional recreation programs, 19.9 percent responded “yes,” 16.6 percent responded “no,” and 63.5 percent answered “not sure.” See Figure 3.

Respondents were also given the opportunity to write in any additional recreation programs that were not included in the survey's list. Programs that received the most number of votes were: indoor and/or outdoor pool (n=4), climbing gym/climbing wall (n=4), ice hockey (n=4), and Tai Chi (n=4). 

PART 5: FUTURE PARKS AND RECREATION FACILITIES

The purpose of Part 5 of the needs assessment was to gauge the respondents' interest in future recreation *parks and facilities* in Orange County, and if such facilities and areas were deemed needed. The three questions in this section were all in regards to what types of facilities, centers, and parks the respondents would like to see developed in Orange County over the next ten years.

First, respondents were asked if they thought Orange County needs additional parks. As can be seen in Figure 4, 30.3 percent answered “yes,” 18.7 percent answered “no,” and 51.0 percent answered “not sure.”

Does Orange County Need Additional Parks?




Respondents who answered “yes” to the previous question were then asked where they would like to see additional parks built, or what type of additional parks they would like to see built. Responses to this question were sorted into those who indicated type of park only, those who indicated location only, those who indicated type of park plus a specific location, and miscellaneous.

The top five responses for types of parks were: hiking/jogging paths (n=11), nature trails/trail system (n=10), bike paths/mountain bike trails (n=8), green space (n=6), and walking trails (n=5). The only suggested locations that received multiple responses were “South Orange” (n=4), “North Orange” (n=3), “Blackwood Farm” (n=2), and “South near border of Chatham County” (n=2). Please see Appendix L for the all of the responses to this question.

Next, the respondents were asked if they thought Orange County needed additional recreation facilities and centers. As can be seen in Figure 5, 23.7 percent answered “yes,” 23.2 percent answered “no,” and 53.1 percent answered “not sure.”

Respondents who answered “yes” to the previous question were then asked what type of recreation facilities and centers they would like to see built. The top responses to this question were: pool (n=19), gym and exercise equipment (n=8), bike trails (n=5), facility like Sportsplex (n=5), passive facilities/open space (n=4), picnic areas (n=4), and trails (n=4). Please see Appendix M for a complete list of all responses.

The third question in Part 5 of the survey asked respondents to check the top five recreation facilities that they would like to see developed by Orange County over the next ten years. The respondents' top choices were walking trails (48.1%), nature trails (35.8%), biking trails (29.4%), greenways (28.8%), and a swimming pool (21.5%).

Seven additional facilities that were selected by more than 10.0 percent of respondents were an amphitheater (18.9%), water parks (15.1%), nature centers (14.7%), picnic areas (13.1%), an indoor athletic complex (11.9%), dog parks (11.3%), and playgrounds (11.1%). See Table 10 for all responses.

PART 6: FINANCING RECREATION AND PARK FACILITY DEVELOPMENT

The purpose of Part 6 was to determine citizen opinions regarding financing future recreation and park facility development. If it is determined that recreation and park facility development was needed during the next 10-15 years, the respondents were asked to indicate their level of agreement with seven possible strategies for funding future development.

The vast majority of survey respondents “strongly agreed” or “agreed” that Orange County should seek private/cooperate donations (93.5%) and state and federal grants (91.2 %) for the financing. The following were the other strategies that approximately two-thirds or more of the respondents “strongly agreed” or “agreed” should be used by Orange County to finance future recreation and park facility development: existing local taxes other than property taxes (71.9%); voter approved bonds (70.3%); existing local property taxes (68.4%); and charging user fees (61.2%). The one funding strategy that the majority of respondents did not feel should be used to finance future recreation and park facility development in Orange County was increasing local taxes other than the property tax (68.4 percent “disagree” or “strongly disagree”). See Table 11 below for the specific findings.



PART 7: DEMOGRAPHICS

The purpose of part 7 of the needs assessment instrument was to obtain information relative to selected demographic characteristics of the survey respondents. Part 7 contained seven questions.

The first two questions dealt with the number of people living in the respondent's household and the number of people in the household in specific age categories. Most households were comprised of more than one person (84.5%). See Figure 6.



Survey respondents were asked to indicate the number of people living in their household by age category. As indicated in Table 12, the total number of households with a person or people in the category of: 0-5 years of age was 63 households (7.6%); 6-12 years of age was 91 households (10.9%); 13-18 years of age was 75 households (9.0%); 19-35 years of age was 102 households (12.3%); 36-55 years of age was 234 households (28.1%); 56-75 years of age was 227 households (27.3%); 76 years of age or older was 40 households (4.8%).

Table 13 contains the information regarding the remaining demographic characteristics of the respondents: whether the respondents owned or rented their primary residence, the race of the respondents, the part of Orange County the respondent resides in, how long the respondent has resided in Orange County, and the respondents' annual household income.

Virtually all of the respondents (99.6%) own their primary residence, while 0.4 percent rent their primary residence. The vast majority (88.3%) of the survey respondents were White (Non-Hispanic), 4.1 percent were African American, 4.1 percent were Mixed Race, 2.3 percent were Asian, and fewer than one percent were Hispanic, Native American or other.

When asked to identify the part of Orange County in which they reside, 39.3 percent of the respondents indicated they live in Chapel Hill, 26.8 percent live in an unincorporated part of the county, 19.6 percent live in Hillsboro, 9.8 percent live in Carrboro, and 4.5 percent live in Mebane.

When asked how long they had resided in Orange County, 36.7 percent of the respondents indicated they have been residents of Orange County for 15-34.9 years. This was followed by 30.6 percent who have been Orange County residents for 5-14.9 years and 17.9 percent who have been residents of Orange County for 35 years or longer. Approximately one fifth of the respondents (13.3%) have lived in Orange County for five years or less.

The final question in the demographic section was optional as it asked survey respondents what their annual household income was. The annual household incomes of the respondents broke down as follows: 22.7 percent had an annual household income of under \$60,000; 40 percent had an annual household income of \$60,000-\$119,999; 26.0 percent had an annual household income of \$120,000-\$200,000; and lastly 11.3 percent had an annual household income of over \$200,000.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Based upon the findings of this needs assessments, the following recommendations are made for consideration of the staff of Orange County Department of Environment, Agriculture, Parks, and Recreation (DEAPR).

- Examine the parks or other recreation facilities/centers the respondents indicated they traveled outside of Orange County to use. What do they offer Orange County residents that DEAPR parks or other recreation facilities/centers do not?
- Attention should be given to the expansion of a trail system linking various areas within Orange County.
- The vast majority of the respondents know parks and recreation programs enhance the physical and mental health of Orange County residents. It is recommended to prominently state these impacts/benefits in all marketing materials, including the departmental website.
- The majority of respondents recognize public parks and recreation programs enhance the economic health of Orange County. Do they know how and to what extent? Conducting an economic impact study would provide data to inform county citizens and public officials what parks and recreation “gives back” to the county from a fiscal perspective.
- Consider using the physical, mental, and economic benefits of parks and recreation in branding the department.
- While many of the respondents have positive opinions regarding the programs, parks, facilities, and staff of DEAPR, roughly a third of the respondents “did not know” about the services provided. In addition, most of the respondents indicated that they did not participate (all organized programs and activities were below 10.0% participation) in any of the organized programs and activities offered by Orange County (e.g., athletic leagues, camps, special events). It is highly recommended that the effectiveness of current marketing and promotional strategies be evaluated.
- Results revealed that there were five items about the Orange County Parks and Recreation that over half of the respondents’ did not know about (Orange County recreation programs and events are well run/operated, Orange County parks and facilities are accessible for use by people with disabilities, Orange County Parks and Recreation staff is helpful and professional, Do public parks and recreation programs help to reduce crime in Orange County?, and If there is a need for additional programs, parks, facilities). This provides the DEAPR staff an opportunity to inform the local community about what Orange County Parks and Recreation does, its accomplishments, and the recreation needs for the county.

- Determine what additional marketing and promotional strategies can be utilized to promote the department's programs, parks, and facilities along with their benefits to the citizens and county.
- The most interest that was indicated for both programs and facilities was for walking/hiking/biking trails. The current trail system should be assessed to determine the possibility of adding new trails.
- To help finance future parks and recreation development, Orange County should seek out grant money through the state and federal level as well as utilizing private/corporate donations.
- When developing or renovating parks consider landscapes that provide large areas of open space for passive recreational activities for all ages. Frequently requested characteristics included shade, picnic tables, and places to walk.

“Trails and Connectivity”

Shaw welcomed participants and all introduced themselves and their affiliation.

Shaw provided an overview of the process for updating the County’s parks and recreation master plan, including the public survey, outreach meetings, and focus groups. He then discussed the purpose of tonight’s focus group meeting to explore trails and connectivity issues in more detail with experts on this subject.

Shaw presented a map showing existing and planned trails and greenways in Orange County. He said the “planned” trails included only those for which there is an adopted plan, such as the Joint Planning Land Use Plan (1986), the NC Mountains-to-Sea Trail (2010), Hillsborough Riverwalk and Cates Creek Greenway.

Bryan recommended adding the walking trails at Lake Michael to the database. He is working with the Town of Mebane on improvements to those trails. Others recommended including the trails located at some of the public schools, including New Hope and Cameron Park elementary schools and Phillips Middle School. Magnuson suggested it may be beneficial to include these trails data on a mapping platform by the name of “Crowdmap” [<https://crowdmap.com/mhi>].

Baker noted she and others prepared a draft map of proposed walking trails throughout the rural sections of the county. The map was intended for a pedestrian component of the Comprehensive Transportation Plan being developed for Orange County. Baker said she was a member of the Orange Unified Transportation Board (OUTboard) that was working on the plan, and she would find out from the Planning and Inspections Department whether that had been adopted. If the plan showing those proposed rural trails has been adopted Baker would like to add to this map. Shaw said he would share the draft rural pedestrian trail plan map with the group.

Magnuson said there are some trails on privately-owned land that are considered available for public use, however they are not mapped anywhere or advertised as being open to the public. He described a “tax abatement” offered by the State of North Carolina for citizens that placed trails on their land into this program. He said one example is an old roadbed used by people in the Davis Drive neighborhood. Shaw offered to find out about this program and share his findings with the group.

[Shaw learned Magnuson was referring to landowner assistance from the federal Forest Stewardship Program, which provides cost-share assistance to install trails

and various wildlife enhancements. The trails remain private and there is no "tax abatement" component. The trails do not become accessible to the public.]

Shaw led the focus group in a discussion of various trail and connectivity issues, prompted by questions listed on the meeting agenda concerning the sufficiency of existing trails, the types of trails needed, the kinds of support amenities that are needed, and connecting trails with existing other public gathering places (e.g., schools, greenways, parks, Duke Forest, etc.).



Bryan asked about the status of the Mountains-to-Sea Trail (MST) through Orange County and the recent controversy of trail planning around Cane Creek Reservoir. Shaw provided an overview of the trail planning process underway, and OWASA's current willingness to allow a segment of the trail to be through its reservoir lands. He noted that the MST will incorporate Hillsborough's Riverwalk and much of the MST will travel through Eno River State Park. Willis said the MST is normally a two-foot-wide tread passing through a 4-foot-wide by 8-foot-tall corridor. Nealon mentioned some difficulties in getting building permits for constructing bridge crossings, noting there are conflicts or inconsistencies between insurance company requirements and Orange County floodplain regulations.

Greene suggested the MST run alongside certain roadways on an interim basis until trail easements are secured through interior properties. The group discussed the potential placement of trails along certain roadways, but noted NCDOT will not sanction formal trails within its right of way.

The group discussed the provision of certain support amenities, such as parking, restrooms, trash receptacles, and signage. The consensus of the group was to not provide trash receptacles except in certain heavy use areas. Better to have people carry out whatever waste they generate along the trail.

Greene recommended there be designated areas for primitive camping available along certain trails in the county.


Bryan asked what kind of trail standards is followed or recommended by different entities. Kelly described the kinds of sustainable trail construction practices employed by County staff at its parks. Nealon noted that trails built several years ago were not sited or constructed to today's standards. Several trails need to be

relocated. Childs noted that was also the case for some Duke Forest trails. All agreed it's much better to build trails right the first time rather than having to go back and retrofit years later. Bryan suggested the master plan could recognize some kind of preferred or common design standard. Furman suggested the County consider establishing a trails advisory committee.

The group discussed the interest in opening up some of the County's land-banked park properties for some limited interim use, such as natural trails with signage. Shaw noted that opening up certain areas to the public will be good, but will require additional staff monitoring and stewardship. He said the County is considering using volunteer site stewards to help monitor properties. Tysinger described Triangle Land Conservancy's use of site stewards at several of its properties.

Shaw said he would summarize this discussion for inclusion in the master plan. He said he would follow up with responses to some of the questions raised and may be back in contact with further questions that might arise on these topics.

Shaw thanked all participants and adjourned the meeting at 7:40 pm.

Parks and Recreation Needs and Action Strategies

Introduction

The 2030 Comprehensive Plan identified a comprehensive list of goals and objectives that were adopted for Orange County's parks and recreation interests. Goals are defined as "general direction-setters" intended to express an ideal future end state for the community, such as providing adequate parks and recreation facilities for all citizens. Objectives define the intermediate steps needed to reach a particular goal.

The parks and recreation goals and objectives are listed below, followed by a brief assessment of where things stand today (Spring 2014) and "action strategies" for achieving each objective.

Overarching Goal: Regionally-coordinated park facilities that provide healthy opportunities for recreation and exercise for all citizens of Orange County, and that preserve important cultural and natural resources.

Goal 1: Provide adequate parks and recreational facilities for all citizens within the County, regardless of age, gender, race or disability.

Objective 1.1 - Acquire and/or retain public ownership of parks, recreation facilities, open space, and conservation areas that will serve Orange County.

Progress: Done, and will continue to acquire sites as recommended by parks and recreation master plan thru Lands Legacy program

Action Strategies:

- Continue to acquire sites recommended by master plan through Lands Legacy program
- Look at possible locations for community centers, pools or other facilities (free standing)
- Ensure new parks are multigenerational to promote mixing of age groups
- Ensure park size is consistent with standards and needs

Objective 1.2 - Acquire and/or retain lands suitable for siting both indoor and outdoor active recreation facilities to serve all Orange County residents.

Progress: Outdoor yes; Indoor partial (Sportsplex serves some, but not all residents)

Action Strategies:

- Complete planned Cedar Grove Community Center
- Pursue PPP for enhancing indoor facilities
- Evaluate and upgrade the Central Recreation Center

Objective 1.3 - Develop a land use planning mechanism for securing new parks through the development approval process.

Progress: Land dedication / Payment-in-Lieu provisions are outdated

Action Strategies:

- Revisit and assess existing Land dedication / Payment-in-Lieu provisions and formulas found in the Unified Development Ordinance

Objective 1.4 - Consider alternative funding possibilities for future park facilities, such as non-profit foundations.

Progress: Naming rights (e.g., Eurosport); grants; foundations¹

Goal 2: Create a partnership among regional recreational providers and facility owners/managers including the appropriate co-location and sharing of school facilities that meets the County's recreation needs.

Action Strategies:

- Promote economic development that is civic minded and funds local needs
- Continue to pursue grants for equipment; capital needs from multi sources (no matter how small)
- Encourage private donations for parks and recreation through new Community Giving Fund
- Friends of Parks & Recreation? Naming Rights? Marketing Space
- Work with Financial Services Department on fundraising

Objective 2.1 - The County will serve as the lead coordinator of regional open space and recreation facility providers in the County (including OWASA, UNC-CH, and Duke University), and coordinate regional efforts including future parkland and recreation facility planning acquisitions and operations/maintenance of community, district and regional park and recreation facilities.

Progress: Intergovernmental Parks Work Group, Land Conservation Alliance (inactive); Coordination of local plans (jury still out); Millhouse Road and Hollow Rock parks upcoming

Action Strategies:

- Continue Intergovernmental Parks Work Group as mechanism; coordinate local plans
- Develop memoranda of understanding to define roles and responsibilities for future joint parks
- Joint funding for nature center(s); Mountains-to-Sea Trail; open space connections
- Develop two joint parks: Hollow Rock Access Area and future Millhouse Road Park

Objective 2.2 - Develop a methodology to be used by regional recreational providers in determining the number of recreation and park facilities needed. The agreed upon methodology should address countywide and community-specific service areas and how needs are determined within those service areas, such as linking facility needs to population growth.

Progress: No joint standards to date, however County links park & recreation needs to population growth

Action Strategies:

- Coordinate service areas and future needs with towns
- Acknowledge and celebrate individual jurisdictions' standards; ensure compatibility for park planning
- Look at findings and insert relevant strategies.
- Recalculate park needs based on estimated population, driving factors, and facilities

¹ 2013 needs assessment survey results indicate this is important

Objective 2.3 - Develop a program for land dedication/recreation payment that is effective and comprehensive.

Progress: Need to revise Payment-in-Lieu / Land dedication section of Unified Dev. Ordinance

Action Strategies:

- Revisit existing dedicated payment-in-lieu provisions (include assessment; redo formulas)

Objective 2.4 - Establish a mechanism to promote shared use of existing public and institutional buildings and grounds for public recreation, as well as for their primary uses.

Progress: Schools (hoping for future breakthroughs); UNC? Duke Forest? Eno River State Park?

Action Strategies:

- Possible programing in coordination with Duke Forest and Eno River State Park
- Finalize and implement Community Use of School Facilities (CUSF) MOA to allow unstructured public and structured community use at school facilities
- Include community access to Cedar Ridge HS auxiliary gym (including days/times of use)
- Include standards for design and use at future renovated schools

Objective 2.5 - Adopt criteria for evaluating potential land acquisitions for recreation and park facilities in cooperation with other regional park providers

Progress: Lands Legacy program uses such criteria, although not necessarily implemented in coop. with other regional park providers

Action Strategies:

- Include criteria in Joint Parks Memorandum of Understanding (See 2.1)

Objective 2.6 - Develop a Memorandum of Agreement among the local governments on joint capital and/or operational funding for future park and recreational facilities.

Progress: Issue paper written

Action Strategies:

- Develop memorandum of agreement, as stated above (See also Objectives 2.1 & 2.5)
- Relook at Joint Capital Funding for Parks Report (2000)

Goal 3: Provide recreational facilities for public use in a manner that is multi-generational and accessible to all County citizens at both the county-wide and community level.

Objective 3.1 - Locate parks and recreational facilities close to residential areas and transportation nodes, to increase public knowledge and accessibility to these facilities including alternative transportation modes.

Progress: Yes this is done as part of Lands Legacy program land acquisition criteria

Action Strategies:

- Revisit and consider improving parkland acquisition criteria for Lands Legacy program
- Reassess Land Use Element nodes and park criteria

Objective 3.2 - Implement individual park master plans.

Progress: Some master plans have been completed/adopted; others not completed until funding becomes available (and per direction from former County Mgr. Blackmon)

Action Strategies:

- Construct facilities as per CIP, on schedule
- Explore financing possibilities; including possible bond
- Develop timetable for Master Plans needed for CIP parks

Objective 3.3 - Create a new Parks and Recreation Facilities Master Plan Map, to guide future parks planning and help leverage outside funding.

Progress: New parks and recreation master plan underway; to be completed in FY 13-14

Action Strategies:

- Multi-overlay maps that inform what is needed
- Use needs/pop/transportation approach (modified) to examine future needs

Goal 4: Promote healthy lifestyles, quality of life and community building through the provision of a variety of affordable recreational facilities and choice of leisure activities, while responding to the changing needs and interests of County residents.

Objective 4.1 - Developers shall provide for adequate and appropriate open space suitable for active/low-impact recreation in residential developments.

Progress: Land has been acquired through dedication via development approval process; parkland has also been acquired with Payment-in-Lieu funds via same process

Action Strategies:

- Continue to use Payment-in-Lieu funds to acquire parkland
- Revisit and update the Payment-in-Lieu formulas
- Continue to acquire future trail corridors (via land development/dedication process) in locations where there is an adopted trail plan; coordinate with town greenways

Objective 4.2 - Investigate the potential for public and/or private commercial partnerships and recreational facilities needed to serve Orange County's residents.

Progress: HYAA, YMCA summer camps, potential Boys & Girls Clubs (received grants in FY 13-14)

Action Strategies:

- Develop partnership template to evaluate new and ongoing partnership proposals
- Build on existing partnerships; explore new opportunities
- Pursue corporate donations for new or enhanced public facilities

Objective 4.3 - Work to keep recreational facilities and services affordable and sustainable to the general public.

Progress: Good job of this (Some question whether Sportsplex/ HYAA are affordable)

Action Strategies:

- Continue policy of not charging entry fees for County parks and facilities
- Continue to subsidize programs by offering low rates; use Soccer Superfund to assist schools

Objective 4.4 - Periodically survey the public and conduct needs assessments on recreation services.

Progress: Those who participate in recreation are surveyed annually; others more regularly (e.g., Little River Park); comprehensive survey completed for this master plan

Action Strategies:

- Continue to survey program participants on regular basis (Rec programs, Little River Park)
- Conduct a more comprehensive survey of County residents/users every five years
- Continue to solicit input from the public using social media

Goal 5: Ensure that park and recreational facilities are environmentally-responsible and are where cultural and natural resources and open space within these sites are protected.

Objective 5.1 - Locate parks and recreational facilities close to residential areas to encourage informal interaction with nature, encourage walkability, and create areas of wildlife habitat with appropriate recreational facilities within the more populated areas.

Progress: Some County parks are walkable (e.g., Fairview, Efland-Cheeks, River Park, and future Twin Creeks Park); Little River Park and Hollow Rock include areas set aside for wildlife habitat

Action Strategies:

- Continue to use 2030 Comprehensive Plan (Land Use Element) and Lands Legacy program's park acquisition guidelines to identify future park sites

Objective 5.2 - Landscape parks and recreational facilities with native vegetation and minimize water use where practical. Prohibit the use of known invasive non-native species in County facilities, and take steps to eradicate occurrences of the same.

Progress: DEAPR administrative policy was adopted (and being implemented) consistent with this objective; Cedar Grove and Eurosport parks are Green Water Guardian sites.

Action Strategies:

- Continue to implement DEAPR sustainable landscaping principles
- Ensure that this objective is adhered to when designing new park buildings/facilities
- Hold staff/volunteer work days to help eradicate invasive non-native plants and trees

Objective 5.3 - Ensure public access to County-owned parks and nature preserves, but direct facilities and trails away from the most ecologically sensitive sites.

Progress: We are doing a good job of this; part of the parkland acquisition criteria

Action Strategies:

- Continue to design parks/preserves in an environmentally-sensitive manner
- Enlist volunteer biologists to identify any unprotected ecologically-sensitive areas

Objective 5.4 - Encourage development of a system of private open spaces and conservation areas, including nature preserves, parks, linear parks, and scenic vistas compatible with the character of Orange County.

Progress: Considerable progress has been made via Lands Legacy program, local land trusts, Duke Forest, OWASA and other conservation partners

Action Strategies:

- Develop a comprehensive conservation plan (with public review process) that would identify important conservation lands and potential links/connections that would complement and enhance existing protected conservation areas
- Have comprehensive conservation plan adopted by local governments and partners
- Share the comprehensive conservation plan findings with landowners and developers

Objective 5.5 - Develop linear parks and rustic trails in the rural buffer and explore opportunities for preservation and connectivity along other identified stream corridors.

Progress: Periodic acquisitions in Rural Buffer consistent with Joint LUP; Other examples include Hollow Rock/New Hope Creek, Jones Creek Greenway, planned Mtns-to-Sea Trail

Action Strategies:

- Develop Hollow Rock Access Area with trail links to Duke Forest and Jordan Lake
- Pursue additional exactions to link existing Rural Buffer properties intended for future greenway trails; develop trails on these linear properties
- Develop partnerships with private landowners and developers to extend existing public trails and to establish new trail connectivity opportunities
- Continue working with landowners and other partners to acquire land and easements to complete the NC Mountains-to-Sea Trail through Orange County

Orange County, North Carolina – Unified Development Ordinance

Article 7: Subdivisions Section

7.11: Recreational Facilities

7.11.5 Method of Provision or Dedication

- (A) Public Recreation Area
 - (1) Land dedicated for public recreation area as required by this Ordinance shall be designated on both the preliminary and final plat(s) of the subdivision and must be dedicated to an appropriate unit of local government.
 - (2) Determination of the appropriate unit of local government shall be made by the Board of County Commissioners, upon recommendation from the Recreation and Parks Advisory Council and the Planning Board.
 - (3) Acceptance of the dedication may be one in trust if deemed appropriate by the Board of County Commissioners.
- (B) Private Recreation Area
 - (1) Land provided for private recreation purposes must be conveyed to the trustees provided in an indenture establishing an association of homeowners.
 - (2) The recreation area must be conveyed to the trustees subject to covenants and easements to be approved by the Planning Board and Board of County Commissioners and which provide for the continued maintenance and control of the recreation area in a manner which assures its continuing use for its intended purpose.
 - (3) Where the recreation area is conveyed to a homeowners association, the subdivider shall file a declaration of covenants and restrictions in accordance with the provisions of Section 7.14 of this Ordinance.

7.11.6 Payments in Lieu of Dedication

- (A) Any subdivider required to dedicate recreation area pursuant to this Ordinance may, with the approval of the Board of County Commissioners, make a payment in lieu of dedication or make a combination of land dedicated payment.
- (B) Before approving a payment in lieu of dedication, the Board of County Commissioners shall find that no recreation and/or open space sites have been designated on the adopted Comprehensive Plan for property in question.

- (C) The payment in lieu of dedication shall be equal to \$422 per lot for a subdivision to be located in the service area of a community park as shown on the Recreation Service Area Boundaries map available in the Planning Department.
- (D) The payment in lieu of dedication shall be equal to \$455 per lot for a subdivision to be located in the service area of a district park as shown on the Recreation Service Area Boundaries map available in the Planning Department.
- (E) Where a combination of land dedication and payments in lieu are approved, the subdivider shall be given a credit equivalent to \$10,000 per acre of land dedicated for recreation purposes.
 - (1) The credit amount shall be determined by multiplying the number of acres to be dedicated by \$10,000 per acre.
 - (a) If the total payment in lieu as determined above is larger than the credit amount, the subdivider shall pay the difference between the two amounts.
 - (b) If the credit amount is larger than the total payment in lieu as determined above, no additional payment in lieu is required.
 - (c) The subdivider may not transfer the excess credit from one subdivision to another.
- (F) Upon approval by the Board of County Commissioners, payment in lieu of dedication shall be made at the time of final subdivision plan approval or within one year of approval of the preliminary subdivision plan, whichever occurs first.
- (G) All monies received by Orange County pursuant to these requirements shall be used only for the acquisition and development of recreation, park and open space sites to serve the residents of the development and the residents of the immediate neighborhood within which the development is located.
- (H) The Board of Commissioners shall also have the authority to sell land dedicated pursuant to these provisions with the proceeds of any such sale used solely for the acquisition of other recreation, park or open space sites within the immediate neighborhood within which the development is located.
